

# Match Report: Girls u16 Kent County Championships Final By Luca Helder

Featuring Alice Moffatt and Arundhati Ajit (4-6, 6-3, 10, 3)

The first round of finals featured the finalists Moffat and Arundhati going head-to-head.

#### First set

The match started with a bang, as both players traded early breaks of serve. Moffatt came out of the gate with an aggressive, all-out attack, using her forehand to great effect and winning her first-game points with powerful groundstrokes.

However, Ajit quickly responded, targeting Moffatt's backhand and earning a break with a beautiful backhand down the line.

The first set continued to be a roller coaster. After Moffatt suffered three consecutive faults in the 8<sup>th</sup> game, Ajit broke again, taking the lead at 5-3 demonstrating her tactical awareness with a well-placed dropshot winner.

Ajit tried to take control on her serve and get a foothold in this set, but a double fault proved costly in the 9<sup>th</sup> game, 5-4.

Moffatt tried to force a lot of pressure onto Ajit's hand by playing the ball low which unfortunately for her in turn meant that she struggled, hitting the net three times in a row, allowing Ajit to take the first set.

### **Second Set:**

The second set began with Moffatt starting strong on her serve. After four enduring games, Moffatt turned the score from 0-1 to 4-1 as she extended her lead in the 5<sup>th</sup> game that was finished off by a fantastic rally.

As the set unfolded Ajit took a more aggressive approach which paid off and gave her the break... game on!

Ajit's dropshots were proving effective, the sixth game saw Ajit's attacking style pay off, as she approached the net and won a crucial dropshot point.

However, Moffatt quickly responded, serving two aces and winning her next service game to love, showing a newfound maturity 5-3.



The match continued to intensify, with the match on the line, Moffatt's coach could be heard yelling, "Process over prize!"—a clear sign of the philosophy of her team which Moffatt embodied perfectly on the court.

# Match Report: Women's Singles County Championships Final By Luca Helder

### Judy Zhang vs Daisy Rowland (6-2, 6-0)

In a compelling display of tactical tennis, Zhang defeated Rowland in a decisive straightsets victory, showcasing her ability to adapt and a relentless aggressive approach that ultimately overwhelmed her opponent.

### **First Set**
