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### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the year ended 31 December 2024

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The object of Kent Tennis Charitable Incorporated Organisation is the promotion of community participation in healthy recreation - by the development and support of tennis and padel tennis in the County of Kent, the Medway Unitary Authority and the London Boroughs of Bexley, Bromley, Greenwich and Lewisham, for the public benefit of the inhabitants of the area.

Its mission is to transform communities through tennis, by making tennis welcoming, enjoyable and inspiring to everyone.

#### Significant activities

The charity took over the activities and assets of Kent County Lawn Tennis Association at midnight on 31 December 2023. Prior to this date, the charity was inactive aside from the setting up of the bank accounts and a deposit made of £1,200.

### Public benefit

The trustees have had regard to Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and consider that the objectives, aims and achievements of the charity described in the report enable it to meet its duty to the Charity Commission as per section 17 of the Charities Act 2011, and to the benefit of the public. The main activities in relation to public benefit are:

- \* Creating opportunities for all residents of our communities, regardless of age, race, gender, ability and disability, to participate in recreational tennis and padel in a safe, friendly and welcoming environment.
- \* Improving the health and wellbeing of residents by encouraging them to be active by organising and delivering recreational competitive events for adults and children / youngsters which help keep them engaged in the sport of tennis and padel.
- \* Facilitating events for people to try tennis for the first time, including supporting the delivery of tennis in schools, parks, clubs and other community settings.
- \* Working in partnership with organisations, clubs and venues to develop community programmes to promote participation and opportunities for those with a disability or impairment to play tennis and padel and help break down barriers for those in areas with higher levels of deprivation
- \* Offering financial and practical support to clubs, schools, volunteers, coaches and organisations.

### Social investments

Whilst Kent Tennis CIO does not currently have a policy on social investment, it does offer an interest free loan scheme for member clubs. During the year the charity made 2 loans to a value of £50,000. It also continued to accept repayments on the 9 loans acquired with the assets of the predecessor Association.

The charity also has an Equity. Diversity & Inclusion (EDI) policy, and launched its first EDI Action Plan in the spring of 2024 to help achieve its overall vision of Tennis Opened Up. The first report of progress made in delivering against the action plan was published in January 2025. As part of driving greater equity and inclusion in tennis, detailed data mapping undertaken in 2024 identified areas of deprivation in the county which resulted in some investment being made to targeted interventions during 2024. This will be a focus in future years and will be the way by which the charity will make its direct social investment.

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Grantmaking

The charity has made financial awards and grants to both junior players, coaches, playing venues and community programmes / initiatives during 2024. Grants are made on a one-off, annual basis. Some are intended to support opportunities to play tennis for those with disabilities and impairments - such as intellectual impairment, visual impairment, hearing impairment, wheelchair users and others with long-term health conditions such as Parkinson's or dementia. Delivery of these opportunities has taken place in traditional tennis venues such as tennis clubs but also untraditional venues including care homes, faith centres and community centres.,

Other grants have been made to encourage the growth of the sport in areas where there are relatively high levels of poverty and deprivation and where tennis is not well established. A small number of grants were made to individuals either (a) aspiring youngsters where the grant is intended to help meet the costs of competing in junior events based on recent playing performance or (b) coaches where the grant is intended to help support them through their education and qualification. In some instances, grants have been based on financial need to help support the funding of specialist equipment such as sports wheelchairs.

### Volunteers

The charity is run by its volunteers, although there is a small paid professional team of 6 individuals, working various hours.

The strategic direction and management of the charity is overseen by a Board of Trustees, all of whom are volunteers. The role of the Board is to ensure the charity is delivering its charitable aims and managing its assets effectively.

Supporting the Board of Trustees are 5 sub-committees which involve approximately 35 additional volunteers. This, however, is in addition to all the work undertaken by several hundred volunteers in the individual clubs and venues and community programmes that run tennis at a local level. Volunteers are recognised throughout the year, but especially during National Volunteer Week in June each year, and via the LTA Awards, where volunteers are nominated by their peers.

### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

### Levels of participation

The number of adults playing tennis in Kent continues to rise year on year. In 2024, the number of adults playing rose by over 15% to about 207,000 with the number of those adults who played at least once a month increasing by 22% to around 83,000. The number of children playing tennis at least once a week in Kent also continues to rise annually. In 2024, the number of children playing at least weekly rose by 22% to over 25,000.

The Open Court programme is aimed for those with a disability, impairment or a long-term health condition and the number of venues providing specialist sessions for those with a disability or health condition rose from 21 in 2023 to 24 in 2024. The number of players benefitting from these sessions also increased by 85% to over 350 per month.

### Equity, Diversity & Inclusion

The charity created and published its first EDI Action Plan in the spring of 2024 and has reported its progress in delivering change during 2024 in a report published in January 2025. Achievements include:

- \* Appointing a Board of Trustees that closely mirrors the population profile.
- \* Agreeing a policy statement that includes a commitment to transparency.
- \* Using data to understand the demographics of the local population and identify areas of greatest need.
- \* Using targeted interventions to encourage more women and girls and people from diverse ethnic backgrounds to play tennis and/or coach.
- \* Establishing programmes that drive greater levels of participation in areas with higher levels of deprivation.
- \* Establishing a youth group to listen to the voices of young people.
- \* All trustees, committee members and staff undertaking EDI training.
- \* Embedding EDI into the organisation's culture by ensuring EDI is on the agenda of every meeting.
- \* Delivering specialist coaching courses to increase inclusivity.
- \* Appointing 5 EDI mentors to help clubs/venues develop community programmes.
- \* Delivering free Tennis Leaders courses and LTA Youth Start programmes for young people.
- \* Funding 15 clubs to deliver Walking Tennis.

### Competitions

The charity runs the Kent Inter Club League, providing a separate summer and winter league in which 109 clubs and venues took part, involving 788 teams and an estimated 2341 individuals participated. The charity also runs the County Championships in August in which 429 players participated, 378 of whom were aged 18 or under. This is one of the largest county championships in the Country and had the highest number of players aged 10 and under in the country competing. As part of this event, the charity also ran an "Inclusive festival" for those with a disability or impairment and 16 people took part in that. With the continual increase in people playing padel, the first Padel County Championships were held in 2024 which attracted 38 players.

As part of encouraging children to be active and take up tennis, the charity encourages clubs to reach out to its local schools and during the year a number of clubs hosted schools' festivals which has seen the number of schools delivering tennis in the county continuing to grow. To support this, the charity runs Schools Competitions for both Primary and Secondary Schools. An increasing emphasis has been placed on encouraging schools within the State sector to enter these and in 2024 there was a 53% increase in the number of state primary schools competing compared to 2023.

Whilst nationally there is a shortage of qualified coaches, the number of coaches registered in the county did increase during 2024. However, only approximately 20% of qualified coaches are female. The charity made positive efforts to encourage more females to start taking coaching qualifications by offering female-only coaching courses at discounted rates or in some instances where the cost to attend the course was a barrier, free. Approximately 40% of new learners were female during 2024. In increasing the workforce, the charity is also encouraging more people from a diverse ethnic background to start seeking a coaching qualification. There is also a shortage of officials and whilst the gender balance unlike the coaching workforce is good efforts have been made to increase the number of officials with an emphasis on diversifying the ethnic mix.

### Fundraising activities

The charity continues to raise funds via a Supporters Club, and through commercial partners. The level of income raised has increased from a historic average of around £37,000 annually to £116,982 in 2024.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

### Financial position

Income from charitable activities in the year totalled £263,733 - consisting of registration fees £13,732, Supporters Club subscriptions of £4,317, competition income of £26,649, grants from the LTA totalling £99,916, performance income of £42,619, and sponsorship income of £76,500 (Note: in addition to sponsorship, other fundraising activities generated donations and Gift Aid totalling £36,165, bringing the total to £116,982, as noted in the section above).

Charitable costs, excluding exceptional items and the use of the Bromley Tennis Centre (note 2) totalled £272,035. Additionally there were central support costs of £45,216.

Overall, with the transfer of the activities and assets of Kent County Lawn Tennis Association, plus the writing off of the LTA loan, the charity made a surplus of £413,536. Income from competition and tournament entry fees was largely balanced out by associated costs of providing those activities.

The largest costs of the charity are staff costs which cover providing specialist skills in:

- \* running competitions and tournaments including for schools and those with disabilities.
- \* coaching and supporting the training programmes for talented youngsters.
- \* improving diversity and inclusion.
- \* governance and the relationship with commercial partners.
- \* social media, website and other communication.
- \* general customer support to players, coaches, officials, clubs and venues in the county.

### Principal funding sources

The charity receives its income from:

- \* sponsors, donors and supporters
- \* tennis clubs, venues and community tennis programmes as well as their players
- \* the national governing body of tennis LTA Limited Investment.

### Policy and objectives

In line with its corporate objectives, the trustees considered that the funds it held should be invested in the furtherance of tennis and padel and in pursuit of that objective decided in 2024 to invest in interventions that (a) improved equity, diversity and inclusion in both sports and (b) ensured tennis and padel were environmentally sustainable going forwards. The trustees will review this annually.

### Reserves policy

A Reserves Policy has been in place for many years in the predecessor organisation and was reviewed and an updated version of that policy was adopted by the charity in February 2024.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

At an EGM in January 2024, the members elected a Board of 9 trustees, including the 3 Officers - Chair, Treasurer and Secretary. A further trustee was co-opted in December 2024. The first AGM was held on 29 April 2024 and the next one will take place on 23 April 2025. There are no provisions giving rights to any organisation or body to nominate trustees

One-third of all trustees stand down at each AGM and may stand for re-election in line with the charity's constitution. An invitation for others to put themselves forward for election is highly visible each year in the weeks before each

In line with its EDI policy to be as inclusive as possible, the charity looks to recruit trustees and other volunteers from both diverse backgrounds and different age groups and has developed an Inclusive Recruitment Approach that applies to both trustees and other volunteers.

### Organisational structure

In January 2024 the members elected a Board of 9 trustees, including the 3 Officers - Chair, Treasurer and Secretary. A further trustee was co-opted in December 2024. The Board is supported by 5 committees, each looking after specific areas of the charity's activity:

- \* Finance
- \* Clubs, Coaches & Community
- \* Governance
- \* Competition
- \* Performance Tennis

### Induction and training of new trustees

Following the commencement of activity on 1st January 2024, all trustees received a comprehensive programme of induction throughout the year. A culture of continuous learning is being adopted and further learning and training opportunities for trustees, staff and the wider volunteer community are actively being pursued.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 December 2024

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment

- 25% on reducing balance

### Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
